We announce with very sincere regret the death of one of our leading and highly esteemed citizens Mr. Joseph Matternson, J. P. Castle Troy House, who passed away yesterday morning April 2nd. 1903, at the county infirmary. Mr. Joseph Matternson successfully underwent an operation some ten days ago, but some time later his strength began to fail.

Toward the close of the past week his condition was regarded as extremely grave. He gradually sank, and passed away peacefully at 6.45 o'clock on Monday Morning.

The deceased who was in his 66 years was a son of the late Mr. Joseph Matternson a Cumberland gentleman who settled down in Limerick Ireland in 1820, and formed the extensive bacon curing business, now known as J. Matternson and Sons Limited, one of the oldest of the kind in the United Kingdom. In coming to this country this gentleman followed the example of his brother in law Mr. John Russell, a native of the same shire, who years previous to the date mentioned started a bacon factory in this city, and after a most successful career eventually retired from business Mr. Jos. Matternson senior died in 1856 and Management of the firm then devolved on the sons William and Joseph in London while the latter took charge of the Limerick and Watertford factories both of which employ a very large number of hands.

Mr. William Matternson died at the age of 71 years in January 1903, since which time the gentleman whose demise we now record has been chairman of the firm, and also William Matternson and Company of London. Mr. Joseph Matternson was the most active and energetic business man, and almost to the last was at the post of duty. He was a man of a most kindly courteous, and an assuming manner ever easy of access, consistent with the pressure of business responsibilities and evincing the same general manner to all with whom he came in contact, rich and poor alike. The extent of his most generous charity will never be known and in all movements of a philanthropic nature, or tending to the material benefit of his native city, he took a deep and practical interest still he was a man who in the ordinary sense of the word was not ambitious for public life or public honor. He was an old member of Limerick Chamber of Commerce, and one of the oldest surviving magistrates of the city. He was a vice patron of the Protestant Young Men Association and this name has long been identified with the Diocesan Synod and church affairs generally in short Mr. Matternson death has created a void in our city where he resided all his life which it will be difficult to fill, and the deepest sympathy of a host of friends in country and city is tendered to Mrs. Matternson and family in their keen sorrow.

The funeral will leave Castle Troy House at eleven o'clock tomorrow Wednesday for family burial place at Kilmurry. Limerick Ireland.
